He appears to have written from the vicinity of Jerusalem sometime after the destruction of the city by the Babylonians (586 BC) but before the invasion of Edom by the Babylonians thirty-five years later." Obadiah did his work for the Lord and faded into the background. A servant labors for God's **glory**, not for his or her personal fame.

Oil is a symbol of the **Holy Spirit**; wine is a symbol of **joy**; leaven is a symbol of **evil**; and Jacob and Esau are symbols of the **flesh** and of the **Spirit**. What is the enemy's goal? He wants to **steal**, **kill**, and **destroy** (John 10:10). He is the father of all **lies** (John 8:44). He desires to **devour** people (1 Peter 5:8).
