Mark 5:21-24 says, "And when Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered about him, and he was beside the sea. Then came one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name, and seeing him, he <b>fell at his feet</b> and implored him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well and live.' And he went with him. And a great crowd followed him and thronged about him." In another story, a woman with an issue of blood found herself in Jesus' presence. She came up behind Jesus and touched His garment. Her bleeding stopped immediately. Jesus turned to the crowd and asked, "Who touched my garments" (Mk. 5:30)? Mark records, "But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling and <b>fell down before him</b> and told him the whole truth" (Mk. 5:33).
